Affirmation: Divine energy flows through me.

Getting to the Heart of the Lesson

Divine energy is always available to us if our hearts are open and willing to let it flow.

Every parent and teacher has had the experience of asking a child to do something, and the child responds with exaggerated exhaustion. He may move as if he were dragging heavy weights behind him or may even ask for help because he feels the tremendous feat of endurance you have requested is just beyond his present capabilities. But, ask this same exhausted child if he would like to visit a favorite friend or go out for a favorite treat, and he responds with energy and enthusiasm. The difference is willingness.

In this lesson's story, the coins represent the divine energy that comes to us in any form. The first two servants discover how much can be accomplished when they use what is available with determination and focus. The third servant loses the opportunity because she is unwilling to even try.

Right attitude opens us to the infinite cosmic energy. There really is no limit to the energy available to us; we are only limited by our willingness. We can teach our children that God is the source of all that is, and all that is is energy. Saints and mystics have always understood that all energy comes from the one power behind and within the universe; modern science is just catching up to the idea.

Teacher Reflection

- What time of day are you most energetic? Least energetic?
- What activities help you to feel full of energy? What activities drain your energy?

- What people in your life give you energy? Who takes your energy?
- Based on the answers to these questions, are there any changes you would like to make in your life to feel more energetic?

I. Opening the Lesson

Read the story of The Three Servants and the Coins, which you can find at the end of this lesson, and use the discussion questions to help the children understand how it relates to the heart of the lesson. Do the affirmation together a few times, using the techniques suggested in Using this Curriculum.

II. Building the Lesson

After the story, transition to Experiment with Affirmations, which illustrates how our thoughts change our energy. After the activity, read the first Bible verse and the first quotation and explain how when having faith and being open and trusting, we can be full of positive, divine energy.

Discuss what activities require a lot of energy and what makes us feel like we have no energy. Then do the Energy Pictures Activity.

Experiment with Affirmations

Materials needed: butcher paper or newsprint, two colored markers

The thoughts, "I'm too tired," and "I can't do it," are negative affirmations that shut off the flow of divine energy. Teach the children the power of positive affirmation by creating a game.

Tape a long piece of butcher paper or newsprint vertically on the wall. Stand next to the paper with a colored marker. Have the children take turns standing near the wall and jumping up as high as they can, reaching up the wall with their hand. Use the marker to mark how high they reach. Before the first round, have all the children repeat together, "I'm too tired, I can't do it." Suggest they think about something

difficult to do.

After everyone has had one turn, change the affirmation and repeat, "Divine energy flows through me!" Be positive and forceful. Encourage everyone to try harder and reach higher. Use a different colored marker to record the second round, and then compare all the jumps. Discuss how our thoughts are actually a form of energy and negative thoughts can change the flow of energy within us.

Energy Pictures Activity

Materials needed: drawing paper, crayons or color pencils

The children can draw pictures of themselves in an activity where they feel the most energy or draw something that represents energy. Give abstract and concrete examples to get them started: a hydroelectric dam on a river, a racecar, a roller coaster, the sun, a spider weaving a web, a healthy meal, etc.

III. Closing the Lesson

After the Energy Pictures activity, transition to the Music and Energy Activity. Explain how divine energy is flowing through us all the time but energy can be felt in different ways. Have the children experience the Active, Slower, and Calming music selections. Right after the calm music experience, you can share the second quotation, which speaks to the natural energy rhythms of nature and reminds us that God's energy does not stop. Close the lesson with a prayer.

Music and Energy Activity

Materials needed: Variety of music selections of different tempos

Music conveys energy in a unique way. Play active music and encourage the children to skip around and move freely. Then change to a slower rhythm and show them how to keep their feet in one place, moving only their arms and torso. Finally, play calming, peaceful music and have everyone lie down with eyes closed. Suggest they feel the music as a rock would, without moving, but still experiencing the energy that is within

all creation. Suggestions for music are below.

>> THE THREE SERVANTS AND THE COINS

There were once three servants who worked for a wealthy and generous man. One day the man was preparing for a long journey and called his servants to him.

"You are honest and hardworking servants, and I want you to take care of my wealth while I am gone," he explained. "Each of you will have a portion to use as you like, and when I return you can show me what you have accomplished."

He gave the first
servant
five coins
and told
her that
she could
choose
how to use
them. He felt sure
she would have no
trouble managing such a
large portion of coins for him.

To the second servant he gave two coins. He explained that she was also free to decide how to manage the coins, and he had great confidence in her.

The third servant was given one coin to use, and as she nervously accepted the coin, he smiled warmly at her and told her there were hundreds of ways she could use the coin, and he was looking forward to hearing of their choices when he returned.

The first servant took the five coins she was given and immediately made plans.

She knew an oil merchant who gave her a large amount of oil for a very low price. She put the oil in pretty jars and took it to the market to sell. It

was a lot of work to take the heavy jars to the market each day and then carry home the remaining jars. But she

enjoyed talking with all the customers, and so many people bought her oil that when it was time for her master to return, she had doubled the number of coins he had given her.

The second servant loved to weave, so she rushed out to buy wool to weave a large rug. She chose bright,

beautiful colors and set to work at the loom the very same day. Each morning at sunrise, she would go to the loom and work on the rug until the sun went down. Her friends admired the lovely pattern of the rug and the colors that were so cheerful, and many offered to buy it before it was even finished. When her master returned, the servant had four coins to show him.	Lesson Notes:
The third servant fretted over the coin she had been given. What if her master didn't like what she did with it and punished her? What if she worked hard and didn't have any more coins when he returned? What if the other servants made fun of her? What if someone stole it or she lost it? She finally went outside in the night and buried it. On the day of her master's return, she dug up the coin.	
The master said to the first two servants, "You took what you were given and did good and useful work. I can see that you can be trusted with even more, and I joyfully share my abundance with you."	
When the third servant gave him back the one coin she was given, he shook his head in disappointment and said, "You did not even put the coin in the bank, where it could have been used to earn a little interest. You hid it in the dark ground and did nothing. I will take this coin back and I can see that you are not ready for any more, for you did not use what was given you."	
Discussion Questions	
1) What else could the third servant have done with the coin besides bury it?	
2) Have you ever not made an effort to learn a new skill, make a friend, or try hard in school because you just didn't want to work at making it happen?	
3) What takes more energy: starting a business or burying a treasure in the yard?	
4) Is it ever difficult to choose to work hard? Do you know anyone who has a lot of energy and accomplishes difficult things?
